I then follow this up by running through questions inspired by Susan May Warren's <i>The Story Equation</i> ² . I highly encourage you to put these together for robust, unique characters.
What Lie do you believe that drives you and shapes your spiritual beliefs? This can come straigh from the Enneagram – or that can be a starting point for exploration.
What is your greatest fear? Again, this can come from the Enneagram.
Who are you? How would you identify yourself? We often forget that the labels we adopt for ourselves trump whatever labels others use.
What are you good at? What do you excel at? When do you hit flow?
When the going gets tough, what do you do? Where do you hide? How do you put yourself to sleep in a sense?
What truth will set you free? Once again, the Enneagram can help immensely.
Lastly, and this one is particularly hard for me, what makes your character happy? What is his or her happiest/favorite memory?
